Introduction

The 2011 Census of Municipalities is Municipalities Newfoundland and Labrador's third census of municipal governments, with previous surveys conducted in 2003 and 2007. The 2011 Census of Municipalities was completed by 219 municipalities, a substantial increase from the 2007 Census, which was completed by 178 municipalities, though a decrease from the 2003 Census that was completed by 254 municipalities. In further comparison, the 2011 Census ranks behind the 2008 Self-Assessment Survey, which was completed by 251 municipalities, though the 2008 Survey was a much larger project with a broader mandate, larger budget, and longer timeframe.

The 2011 Census of Municipalities is a more comprehensive and much longer document than the 2003 and 2007 censuses. In many ways, the 2011 census is similar to the 2008 Self-Assessment survey, though the 2011 census sought only quantitative information, leaving no room for the "to some degree" response that was given as a choice in the Self-Assessment project. Another significant difference in the 2008 and 2011 projects is the exclusion in the 2011 census of questions dealing with community well-being. While an important part of a municipal government, community well-being is difficult to quantify and is subjective. The purpose of the census was to eliminate as much subjectivity as possible. That is why we left no room for general comments anywhere in the census form.

While efforts were made to limit subjectivity, MNL appreciates that subjectivity will filter in to some responses; that is an inherent risk for any survey that covers the broad horizons of municipal government. For example, the final question in section 10 of the census asks, "Does your existing revenue finance all your municipal services?" This question invites a subjective response, as the respondent may think that the municipality would offer more services if it had more revenue, and therefore, the respondent may answer "no" the municipality does not have enough existing revenue. There is little MNL can do to eliminate such subjectivity, nevertheless it should be given its proper consideration when analyzing the results.

MNL is getting better at creating and delivery censuses. The 2011 census builds off the strengths of the 2003 and 2007 questionnaires and the 2008 Self-Assessment Survey. MNL was also able to adjust questions or ideas that could have been improved in past censuses and surveys, allowing it to avoid some previous errors. As well, MNL enhanced some questions by looking at questionnaires and self-assessment surveys of other provinces. The 2011 census questionnaire is long because we are building off of the work that was done previously. MNL's goal is to create something that is comprehensive, as a result, we cannot create something that is brief.

With that said, the questions the 2011 census asked were not perfect. Despite extensive MNL staff attention to the details of the questions, mistakes were made, though they appear to be minor and involve a little timeline overlap in the answer choices in a couple of questions. No one at MNL is an expert at survey creation, and, in an effort to keep costs under control, an outside consultant was not retained. In fact, the 2011 Census of Municipalities was a very cost-efficient project. The entire cost of the census (not accounting for time provided by the permanent staff) was approximately \$1000.00. There is no doubt that this project was worth the cost.

The 2011 Census of Municipalities also represented a significant technological step forward for how MNL interacts with its members. This was the first ever MNL survey/questionnaire that allowed members to enter and submit responses over the Internet. This was due largely to the technology available through *Survey Monkey*, which allowed for the easy creation, delivery, and completion of the census. MNL is making full use of this technology, and has made and will make other surveys, like the current *Regional Government Workbook*, available through *Survey Monkey*. Yes, some municipalities preferred to submit hard copies of the census, but this only accounted for approximately 25% of all respondents.

It is also impossible for MNL to verify the responses provided by the participating municipalities. MNL appreciates that those completing the census did their best to be accurate and honest. Unfortunately, it is certain that some of the information provided is wrong or inaccurate. There is nothing that MNL can do to avoid this problem; the census is an important project for MNL and it must accept the risks involved with soliciting information with no verification method. MNL is also keenly aware that some responses can be misleading. For example, a municipality could reply that it is involved in economic development through its own economic development committee. However, if this committee meets only once or twice a year, it is difficult to classify a municipality as being actively involved in economic development. Again, there is little MNL could do to eliminate these problems without making an already long census questionnaire even longer.

Lastly, MNL wants to thank all municipalities that participated in the 2011 census. The census questionnaire was long, and we appreciate the efforts of those who took the hour or two necessary to complete the questions. The information provided by our member municipalities will assist MNL in formulating policy and in providing services to, and advocating on behalf of, members. MNL also wants to thank the summer students that worked diligently on making the census a success. It was at times difficult work, but they remained committed and performed professionally.

Census Summary

Before moving into the presentation of the summary results, it is important to note the differences that may exist in the number of municipalities that answered certain questions. Not every question in the census was applicable to every municipality. As a result, not all questions have the same number of respondents. There are also partially completed census questionnaires. Some respondents abandoned the census after a couple of sections. Thus, we have 219 completed census questionnaires, but a total of 231 complete and incomplete questionnaires. This will explain why some questions have more than 219 responses.

Note on classification of municipalities:

Small Municipality: fewer than 1000 residents

Medium Municipality: between 1000-4000 residents

Urban Municipality: greater than 4000 residents

Population of Responding Municipalities

This question received 224 responses.

- 334,191 the total population of the municipalities that answered the census.
- It is important to note that St. John's did not complete the census. The City did review the census, but declined to participate out of concern that its responses would skew the overall results of the census.
- 1519 the average population of the municipalities that answered to census.
- 550 the median population of the municipalities that answered the census. The median population number indicates that half of the municipalities that participated in the census had populations above 550, and half had populations below.
- The median population number is more important, as it accurately reflects the significant number of very small municipalities that exist in Newfoundland and Labrador.

This question received 223 responses.










3. How Councils are Elected

This question received 220 responses.







The age of Mayors, Deputy Mayors, and Councillors - 2007




The two important numbers to consider when considering these two charts are:

- The number of elected municipal officials who are 35 years of age or under has remained consistent at 47. It is apparent that more young people are not becoming directly involved in municipal government.
- The number of elected municipal officials who are 65 years of age or older has increased from 89 in 2007 to 138 in 2011, a 55% increase.

9. Do members of your municipal council receive remuneration?

This question received 222 responses.



The percentages and values set out in the above chart are misleading and do not provide an accurate reflection of the poor state of councillor remuneration. The census questionnaire also asked for the amount that council members were paid. A total of 163 municipalities declared that their councils receive some remuneration, and 160 provided us with the exact amounts. They are categorized below according to the positions on council.

<u>Mayors</u>

- 48.1% (75) less than \$1000 per year
- 19.9% (31) between \$1000 to \$2000 per year
- 10.9% (17) between \$2000 to \$3000 per year
- 21.2% (33) more than \$3000 per year

Deputy Mayor

- 52.6% (80) less than \$1000 per year
- 21.7% (33) between \$1000 to \$2000 per year
- 6.6% (10) between \$2000 to \$3000 per year
- 19.1% (29) more than \$3000 per year

Councillors

- 55% (88) less than \$1000 per year
- 20.6% (33) between \$1000 to \$2000 per year
- 8.1% (13) between \$2000 to \$3000 per year
- 6.9% (26) more than \$3000 per year


When considered in conjunction with the municipalities that do not pay any council remuneration, it is clear that:

- 74% of responding municipalities pay their mayor between zero and \$2000.00 per year
- 77% of responding municipalities pay their deputy mayors between zero and \$2000.00 per year
- $\bullet~$ 81% of responding municipalities pay their councillors between zero and \$2000 per year

For the municipalities that answered less than once per month, the responses varied from "every 3 months", to "every two or three months" to "whenever all the councillors are available."


11. Does your municipality have problems with elected members not attending regular council meetings?



13. Have you ever dismissed a councillor due to the lack of attendance at council meeting?

This question received 220 responses.



In the comments section of this question, the reasons behind the dismissals were set forth. It appears that councillor dismissal is not common, and most municipalities that have done so report the dismissal occurring several years ago. Most causes for dismissal were straightforward: a councillor missed three straight meetings without notice, a councillor went out of town to work and did not ask for a leave of absence. One municipality noted that it sent warning letters to a councillor, who eventually resigned.


14. Are all your councillors residents of your municipality?











Breakdown according to size of municipality






The different committees of council - Medium Municipalities




The different committees of council - Urban Municipalities













5. How is municipal staff paid?




Breakdown according to size of municipality












6. What are the annual earnings of your municipality's senior staff?









Breakdown municipality according to size of municipality




















The services that municipal governments are currently sharing - Western








How does your municipality charge business tax? - Urban Municipalities




The comparison of current mil rates to previous mil rates illustrates that municipal governments are not attempting to be revenue neutral. The property assessment increases

of 2009 did not result in significant corresponding changes to property tax rates. The average property tax rate has dropped, but only by a mere 0.06 mils, and this is solely the result of reductions by medium and urban municipalities; the average mil rate of small municipalities increased by 0.1 mills. Moreover, the decrease in the mil rate for urban and medium municipalities has little impact on the operational capacity of these municipalities, as only 3 of the 60 medium and urban municipalities do not have the capacity to take on additional debt (please see question 7, section 7).

Meanwhile, the median mil rate in the province increased by 0.5 mils and the range of mil rates increased at the low end – from 2 to 2.5 mils – and at the high end – from 14 to 15 mils. Municipal governments appear to be taking advantage of increased property assessments.




The combined assessed value of all properties in your municipality - Small Municipalities




Steps municipalities would take if they could not generate enough revenue to conduct existing municipal services - Urban Municipalities








The services provided by municipalities and whether they are provided directly by the municipality or contracted out - Medium Municipalities




The services provided by municipalities and whether they are provided directly by the municipality or contracted out - Urban Municipalities




Percentage of households that are hooked up to a municipal water system - Small Municipalities



Percentage of households that are hooked up to a municipal water system - Medium Municipalities




Percentage of households that are hooked up to a municipal water system - Urban Municipalities






