HISTORICALLY IGNORED

- · Joseph Smallwood, "no indians on the island of NF"
- 1949 Terms of Union (Newfoundland and Canada) no mention of Aboriginal peoples
- Unable to access or participate in federal programs and services
- We did not exist in law

MI'KMAQ OF KTAQMKUK

Historical Experiences

FORCED REMOVAL OF CHILDREN

- Orphanages
- Boarding Schools
- Experienced abuses and trauma
- Little to no education provided

CRIMINALIZATION OF THE MI'KMAW WAY OF LIFE

- Charged for hunting, harvesting and being out on the country
- No longer left alone to live a traditional way of life
- Providers became poachers
- Incarceration rates increase

DISCRIMINATION AND LOSS

- · Left out of the historical record
- Loss of access to traditional territories
- Loss of culture and identify
- Loss of language



Current Fed Laws of Priority:

- Any laws that affect Hunting, Harvesting, and Fishing
- Environmental Assessment Act
- ATR and Reserve Creation Act
- Criminal Justice Act



Future Fed Laws of Priority:

- FN Policing Legislation
- FN Health Legislation

Going Forward ...

- Create internal institution and an ongoing system of checks and balances
- Create tables of Mi'kmaw scholars and lawyers to discuss laws and actions
 - No NDA make tables a part of the government system
- Federal presentations at regional biannual UN Declaration summits
- Commitment of resources and funding
